Avg. Search Depth

The number of pages visitors viewed after getting results for the search term.

Avg. Session Duration

The average length of a Session.

Avg. Time on Page

The average amount of time users spent viewing a specified page or screen, or set of pages or screens.

Bounce Rate

The percentage of single-page sessions in which there was no interaction with the page. A bounced session has a duration of 0 seconds.

Entrances

Entrances is the number of times visitors entered your site through a specified page or set of pages.

% Exit

%Exit is (number of exits) / (number of pageviews) for the page or set of pages. It indicates how often users exit from that page or set of pages when they view the page(s).

Exits

Exits is the number of times visitors exited your site from a specified page or set of pages.

Landing Page

The pages through which visitors entered your site.

New Users

The number of first-time users during the selected date range.

Page

PROPOSED TRANSFER OF CROWN RESERVE 1378 TO SHIRE OF WESTONIA (AA DAM 450 WARRALAKIN TANK)

In September 2021, the Shire of Westonia wrote to the Water Corporation requesting the vesting for the Crown Reserve listed below (which contains a water tank and rock catchment):

AA Dam Name	CT	Reserve	Comment
AA Dam No.450 Wantelakin Tarik	LR2022/612	1378 (Lot 847 on DP203246)	Transfer request from Shire of Westonia, DWER to conduct temedial works prior to transfer.

The transfer of this Crown Reserve will allow the Shire of Westonia to take control of a non-potable water source that is already used exclusively by the local community and the Shire. As such, the Water Corporation welcomes the Shires request.

Therefore, the Water Corporation advises that it has no objection to the transfer of the Management Order for the above Crown Reserve to the Shire of Westonia, subject to the following requirements:

- . The Crown Reserve is transferred in its entirety, including all associated lots.
- The Reserve is transferred to the Shire on an "as-is" basis, and includes all dams, pipes, pumps and other infrastructure that already exists on the land.
- All future responsibility for the Reserve (and associated infrastructure) passes to the Shire of Westonia.
- The Water Corporation is removed from both Responsible Agency and Management Order status for the Reserve.

A Statutory Declaration for the reserve has been provided at Attachment 3. The original Management Order is not in Water Corporations possession, and as such, is not able to be surrendered.

I trust this letter provides the Department with sufficient information to give priority consideration to the proposal described above. Should the Department agree to this proposal, confirmation upon completion of the transfer would be appreciated.

STATUTORY DECLARATION

(full name, address and occupation of person(s) making the declaration)

I, Brian Lanyon Handcock, Manager Property Portfolio of Water Corporation, 629 Newcastle Street, Leederville WA 6007

Sincerely declare as follows -

- I act on behalf of the Management Body for the land described as Crown Reserve 1378 (Lot 347 on DP203246) being the whole of the land comprised in Certificate of Crown Land Title LR3022/612 (the Land).
- 2. The Minister for Water Resources has held a Management Order in relation to the Land from 28 January 1916 to the current date (the Relevant Period).
- 3. I am aware that the Land has been used for the purpose of "Water & Stopping Place" during this time.
- 4. I have made or cause to be made a full and exhaustive review of the Water Corporation's records relating to the Reserve and I declare that:
 - a) No estate or interest in the Reserve has been granted to or created in favour of any person;
 - b) The Water Corporation is not aware of and does not have in its possession, any other documents relating to the Reserve;
 - c) No other person has claimed any other estate or interest in the Reserve; and
 - d) The original Vesting Order/Management Order could not be found.
- 5. I have referred to Annexure B of the Assessment and Management of Contaminated Sites (Contaminated Sites Guidelines - December 2014), which is a document prepared by the Department of Environment Regulation. I am aware that:
- 6. the Land has not been used for any of the Industries, Activities and Land Uses referred to in Annexure B during the Relevant Period; and
 - a) none of the Common Contaminant Types referred to in Annexure B have been used in relation to the Land during the Relevant Period.
 - b) I acknowledge that if the Land is found to be contaminated within the meaning of the Contaminated Sites Act 2003, the Contaminated Sites Act 2003 may place obligations upon me in relation to the Land as a contaminated site.
- 7. An environmental assessment of the Land has not been undertaken by a person qualified and accredited to carry out an assessment of the Land in relation to contamination.



This leaves approximately \$60M available for Stage 2 up to a cumulative total of \$180M with contingency and Project Development of \$7.5M.



Route Priority Ranking

Following the identification of Stage 1 routes, further interrogation of the MCA Priority Route listing was undertaken by the Technical Committee. This included investigation and clarification of eligibility of specific routes. Liaison was also undertaken with relevant LGs to rationalise specific routes.

An updated MCA Priority Route listing in shown in the table below. It should be noted that routes that currently have unsealed sections were action not considered by funding for Stage 2. Hence their priority ranking will become 3 or lower.

Route Commentary

Various routes have been reviewed by the Technical Committee and subsequently the Steering Committee. The following outcomes have been agreed as of 8th February 2021.

Quairading to Corrigin

- This was on the original list of routes agreed by WS, but it was never included on the map or dataset.
- Incorporate with Cunderdin to Quairading route to be a new route Cunderdin to Corrigin
- Incorporate updated data into MCA
 - Potentially fund this route via Stage 2 as it would also connect to Corrigin to Katanning route.

Beverley - Corrigin Route

- Consisted of the following roads
 - Morbinning Road / Old Beverley Road (from Beverley townsite to Quairading – Corrigin Road)



- This road is partially sealed from some length, but remains unsealed for a significant portion.
- It is not really a Regional Distributor route, but more of a short-cut, or Local Distributor.
- What would be a more relevant Regional Freight Route in-line with WSFN ideology are the following roads:
 - Westdale Road (Westdale to Beverley)
 - Mawson Road (Beverley to Mawson)
- Joins Brookton Highway west of Brookton to Quairading-York Road west of Quairading
 - This is actually more reflective of "Dale to Mawson" Route.

Steering Committee liaised with Shire of Beverley requesting the removal of the Beverley - Corrigin Route, and its respective roads, from the WSFN route list, and

- An alternative route named "Dale to Mawson" Route consisting of the following roads be added to WSFN.
 - Westdale Road (Westdale to Beverley)
 - Mawson Road (Beverley to Mawson)

Meeting held with Shire's of Beverley, Brookton, Cuballing, Narrogin, Pingelly and Wandering to discuss rationalisation of routes within this area. Specifically, the rationalisation of 4 routes into 2 routes as follows:

- Narrogin to North Bannister
 - Remains
- Wandering to Aldersyde (via Wandering-Pingelly and North Bannister-Pingelly Roads)
 - Remains
- York to Williams
 - Removed
- Bannister to Pingelly (via North Wandering Road)
 - Removed

Dear Shire Presidents, Councillors, CEOs & Staff,

Firstly, let me congratulate those Elected Members who have been successfully re-elected and warmly welcome the newly Elected Members to Local Government.

The Wheatbelt Secondary Freight Network (WSFN) Steering Committee acknowledges that we have not been as regular with our communications with the 42 Wheatbelt Local Governments about the progress of the project as we would have liked. As the Chairperson of the Steering Committee, I decided that once the Local Government Election process commenced, I would wait until after the elections before communicating with Councils. Updates on the project are always found in the Minutes from the Regional Road Group meetings which are distributed to Delegates and CEO's following each meeting, however sometimes this is not as prevalent as many LGs or WSFN would appreciate and often gets lost amongst other information.

For those that aren't aware, the Wheatbelt Secondary Freight Network is some 4500km of Local Government roads that moves agricultural freight across and through each of our local governments, connecting with the State Road network where possible, to a ensure safe and fit for purpose secondary freight road network. This project first commenced back in 2014, at Regional Road Group level where the conversation was very much around ensuring those strategic roads that connected Local Governments all had the same Heavy Vehicle RAV rating to aid in the efficient movement of freight. This then become a conversation between Wheatbelt North & Wheatbelt South about the same connectivity, it was at this point that Regional Development Australia highlighted that we had a unique project that just might attract some State & Federal Funding. To cut a very long story short, our first round of funding was announced ahead of the May 2019 Federal Election, with a combined total of \$87.5M for WSFN, then in October 2020 on the back of the COVID19 stimulus a further \$100M was announced. Both funding streams are 80% Federal, 20% State (2/3 State & 1/3 Local Government), this is a significant windfall for Local Governments who usually must contribute 30% of the total project costs under most road funding from the Federal & State Governments.

In 2019, all 42 Local Governments formally agreed to be a part of the WSFN Program, including accepting the Program Delivery Plan.

In the past two years we have delivered \$22M worth of Priority 1 projects and are on target to deliver \$32M in this financial year. We would like to sincerely thank those Local Governments that have been involved in the first few years of this project, there have been many teething issues to resolve.

The projects funded under Priority 1 to a total value of \$120M are:

1.	Lancelin to Meckering	\$27M
2.	Dumbleyung to Nyabing	\$5M
3.	Cuballing to Wickepin	\$3M
4.	Dowering to Dalwallinu	\$21M

The Project Delivery Team are currently working with Priority 2 Local Governments on the development of their budgets head of the funding allocation in early 2022. It is imperative that these Local Governments meet the December deadline to be considered for funding under Priority 2, failure to meet this deadline will see Local Governments moved to Priority 3, which is yet unfunded.

The following routes & Local Governments are potentially part of Priority 2, the Project Manager Peter Hall has been working with staff from all these Local Governments since March of this year, to assist in the development of designs and budgets. The report on the progress of this work has been through the minutes of the Regional Road Groups which were distributed to all 42 Local Governments. I have attached this most recent report on the Priority 2 funding process for your information.

- 1. Narrogin to North Bannister (Shires of Narrogin, Cuballing & Wandering)
- 2. Regans Ford to Miling
- 3. Nungarin to Wialki
- 4. Dangin to Kweda
- 5. Cunderdin to Koorda

- 9. Collie to Changerup

- (Shires of Dandaragan & Moora) (Shire of Nungarin)

It is anticipated that the full \$187.5M will be expended by 2025/2026; so, the next 4 years for the Steering Committee will be about lobbying the State and Federal Governments for funding to continue the delivery of the project into Priority 3 and 4 routes. This will only be possible with the successful on time and on budget delivery of Priority 1 and 2 routes.

It is worth remembering that a project of this size, involving this many Local Governments has never been done anywhere in Australia, the success of this project will see Local Governments coming together to deliver outcomes for a region rather than locally for many years to come.

I encourage all Elected Members to familiarise themselves with the overall project, but also with the routes that are within your Local Government and where they sit in the prioritisation of the project. Should you have any questions, in the first instance talk to your Regional Road Group Delegate, if they can't answer your questions then feel free to ring the Chair of your Regional Road Group, or myself.

Local Government reform initiatives announced today represent an informed approach by the State Government to enable a more progressive legislative framework for the sector.

The reform package delivers a longstanding commitment by the State to modernise legislation to better reflect the changing role and expectations of the Local Government sector.

WALGA President Mayor Tracey Roberts welcomed the announcement of a three-month consultation process, saying it would allow for further detailed discussions prior to legislation being drafted.

"Local Government has long been advocating for modernisation of the legislation under which we operate, and this represents the next step in this process," Mayor Roberts said.

"Many of the initiatives outlined as a part of this package will be supported by the sector as they have been informed by engagement between our Members and the Minister for Local Government.

"Further, having a tiered approach to many requirements according to the differing size and scale of Local Governments will greatly assist in their implementation."

Mayor Roberts said Local Governments had been advocating for many of the reform initiatives announced today, including:

- introduction of a contemporary intervention framework
- greater clarity of roles and responsibilities of Elected Members and Chief Executive Officers
- tiered compliance approach to financial reporting requirements according to size and scale of Local Governments
- model financial statements and fit for purpose financial ratios
- improved processes relating to regional subsidiaries to facilitate collaborative service delivery
- reducing unnecessary red-tape and a more flexible approach to enable resource sharing

- retention of current election cycle for Elected Members, and
- simplification of strategic planning processes and community engagement models.

Mayor Roberts said WALGA would consult further with Members on each of the changes outlined across the six themes of the reform package for ongoing discussions with the Minister on best methods or support required for their implementation.

Opposition puts rail safety at passive rail crossings on agenda

The Opposition has welcomed the Minister for Transport's agreement to investigate improving the safety of passive rail crossings in regional WA, following campaigning by rural families.

Leader of the Opposition Mia Davies moved a motion in Parliament this week calling on the State Government to invest in initiatives to increase safety at passive rail crossings in WA.

Ms Davies told Parliament that for over 20 years, four Wheatbelt families have mourned the loss of their loved ones after horrific accidents at passive rail crossings.

"Drugs, alcohol or speed were not factors in the crashes that claimed the young lives of Christian Jensen, Jess Broad, Hillary Smith, or Amanda Dempster, their deaths were entirely preventable," Ms Davies said.

"They simply did not see the train, and there was no warning or signage to alert them a train was on its way – but this can and should be changed.

"It's time we acted to ensure no other families have to experience the same loss and grief."

Ms Davies said the request from the families was simple and could be achieved with co-operation between industry, State and Federal Government.

"They've asked for the installation of flashing lights on the front of trains and LED lights on the side of carriages, the provision of ultra-high frequency radio communication for train drivers to alert nearby trucks to danger, and the installation of solar-powered flashing red lights at passive level crossings," she said.

Ms Davies said she was heartened the Minister for Transport recognised the importance of this issue and pledged to investigate the grieving families' three requests to improve passive rail crossings at a State Government level.

"I thank the Minister for Transport for taking the issue on and agreeing to investigate how the State could support the request from the families," she said.

"In a perfect world, there would be co-operation between the State and Commonwealth to make changes to the regulatory regime to ensure lighting is required on trains and carriages, and funds to upgrade warning lights at the crossings.

"We do not live in a perfect world, but this is the perfect opportunity to ensure no-one else has to experience the grief felt by these families over the past two decades."

Shadow Transport Minister Shane Love said Labor's acceptance that change needs to occur was another step forward in implementing vital safety changes at rail crossings in WA.

"I met with the families at the Yarramony rail crossing earlier this year and since then, we committed to working with them to make the case for change," Mr Love said.

"This acknowledgement by the Minister for Transport that improvements must be made has been another positive move towards creating safer rail crossings across regional WA."
